John 20:19-31

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."22When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." 24But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came.²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side. I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." ³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book.

³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

REFLECT & DISCUSS

Context

The Resurrected One appears first to Mary at the empty tomb, then to all the disciples, then to Thomas (and more appearances continue in John's gospel). In each appearance, there is something required to trigger understanding that this is Jesus, the Risen One. With Mary, it is her name. With the disciples and Thomas, it is the scars of Jesus.

Big Ideas

- **Disarming Doubt**: Thomas is *not* a doubter. Nor is doubt a bad thing.
- Fear locks us in: Peace opens us out.
- Love makes wounds heal

Reflect

- Read the scripture passage carefully and slowly. What word or image stands out to you? Why?
- What happened that you experienced doubt of disbelief? Why might doubt or disbelief be a good (even faith-filled) thing?
- 3. Jesus has wounds, and he shares them with his trusted friends. His wounds even become the source of hope and new life for the disciples and Thomas. How might wounds in your life become sources of healing and hope for others?
