The Spirit: Peace May 27, 2018

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# John 14:25-31

25 'I have said these things to you while I am still with you. <sup>26</sup>But the Advocate,<sup>\*</sup> the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you.<sup>27</sup>Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. <sup>28</sup>You heard me say to you, "I am going away, and I am coming to you." If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. <sup>29</sup>And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe. <sup>30</sup>I will no longer talk much with you, for the ruler of this world is coming. He has no power over me; <sup>31</sup>but I do as the Father has commanded me, so that the world may know that I love the Father. Rise, let us be on our way.

# **REFLECT & DISCUSS**

#### Context

John's Gospel meditates on the role and nature of the Holy Spirit in several places, including the passage above. There is even a unique "Pentecost Story" in John, where Jesus gives the Holy Spirit to his disciples in the upper room (John 20:22). In John, the Spirit makes the presence of Jesus enduring and enduringly accessible: teaching truth, gifting peace, and strengthening the community to "rise" and "be on our way" in ministry and mission.

### Big Idea & Quote

Too often we prefer "a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice."
